**CHINESE ZODIAC**

The Chinese Zodiac, known as Sheng Xiao, is based on a twelve-year cycle. Calculated according to the Chinese lunar calendar, each year in that cycle is related to an animal sign. These signs in order are the rat, ox, tiger, rabbit, dragon, snake, horse, sheep, monkey, rooster, dog and pig. There exists a story, in Chinese mythology, of a great race that decided which animals made it into the Zodiac and in what order.

In one version of the story, a long, long time ago, before his departure from earth, Buddha decided to have a grand race, and all the animals in the kingdom were invited. Unfortunately, only 12 animals showed up at the event. Grateful for their efforts, Buddha rewarded them by naming each year of the Chinese Zodiac calendar after these 12 animals. And it was arranged according to the order of their arrival – as listed above, the rat came first, followed by the ox, and the pig was last.

**YEAR OF THE PIG**

2019 is the Year of the Pig according to the Chinese Zodiac. This is a Year of Earth Pig, starting from the 2019 Chinese New Year on February 5 and lasting until 2020 Lunar New Year's Eve on January 24 2020.

Despite some of the less-favourable traits we typically associate with swine, in fact, in Chinese culture, pigs represent wealth and treasure, because of their importance within an agrarian society.

From an astrological perspective, people born during the year of the Pig (which includes 1947, 1959, 1971, 1983, 1995, 2007, and 2019) are believed to be philanthropic and generous, but also disciplined and hard-working. Pigs are very social and friendly, enjoy entertaining, and have a love for life.

## ALMA ACTIVITIES

### BILINGUAL RADIO PROGRAM

ALMA continues to assist with the Mandarin language program on community radio 2XX every Friday evening from 7pm -7.30pm. The program aims to promote the use and learning of Mandarin in the ACT area and to inform the community, especially the Chinese speaking community, about local events and other information of interest.

Each program usually includes a children's song and short story in Chinese and is presented bilingually to help develop the language and cultural understanding of both Chinese and English-speaking listeners. Parents and teachers are encouraged to send a recording (MP3 format preferred) of children singing a song or reading a short story or poem for broadcast on the show. This has proved to be a good way to encourage interest in practicing Mandarin. It may also be possible to invite children to broadcast live from the 2XX studio in Civic on a Friday evening.

### MANDARIN COMMUNITY TUTORING PROJECT

This free community project brings together fluent speakers of Mandarin and learners of the language who wish to further develop their knowledge of Mandarin and/or understanding of Chinese culture. The Chinese Australian Early Childhood Centre (CAECC) continues to be the main focus for the Committee. In January we saw Alyce Hawkins move on to take up the role as the Director of the Early Learning Centre at Googong. This is a great opportunity for her and we wish her all the best. At the same time the Committee recruited a very experienced Assistant Director – Claudia Gelonese. If you see Claudia around please make her feel welcome.

The CAECC management team is actively managing the waiting list and enrolments. The centre saw a sharp decline in enrolments in February as students transitioned from CAECC to Mawson Primary School. The management team along with the Committee are working hard on rebranding the centre to assist with the development of the social media and marketing campaign. Some families may have already noticed an increased presence on various social media apps including Facebook and WeChat. We anticipate the increased focus on marketing the centre will enviably lead to increased enrolments for the centre.

The most popular activity was making jiaozi (dumplings); parents and children worked together to create various shapes of dumplings.

We also invited a Canberra Times reporter to our celebrations. She sent a photographer and The Canberra Times published the Centre's Lunar New Year celebrations on 3 Feb 2019.

The children from the Infant/toddler room went to the Preschool room and office to "拜年 (Bàinián)" (wish a happy New Year) and to wish everyone a healthy and happy Year of the Pig.

### Celebrating the Lantern Festival 19 February 2019

Preschool children learnt a new song: 卖汤圆 (Mài tāngyuán) "Selling Sticky Rice Dumplings". Children found the song very interesting and some said they have tried 汤圆 before. The Educator also taught another Mandarin nursery song about the Lantern Festival to the children.

The highlight was actually making the sticky rice dumplings 汤圆 (tāngyuán)! The children showed their great interest in rolling the sticky rice dough into many small balls and shared their happiness with their peers and educators. "Yummy 汤圆(tāngyuán)!" commented several of the children as they ate their creative rice balls.

The Infant/Toddler room children made strawberry 汤圆 (tāngyuán) to celebrate the Lantern festival.
