

LUNAR NEW YEAR OF THE OX



The Year of the Ox began on 12 February 2021. The ox is a valuable animal in Chinese culture because of its important role in agriculture, and its intelligence and hardworking nature.

During new year celebrations, also known as the Spring Festival, it is considered auspicious to eat a special cake made with glutinous rice flour because the Mandarin word for New Year Cake *niángāo* 年糕 is a homonym of *niángāo* 年高, which means “prosperous (new) year.” Niangao can be sweet, made with sugar, dried fruit and nuts or bean paste, or savoury, with scallions, meat and cabbage. It is provided as an offering to the Kitchen God and can be traced back to the Northern and Southern Dynasties (386-589AD).

Qīngmíng jié 清明节, or the Tomb Sweeping Festival, is when Chinese people visit the burial sites of their ancestors to pay respects and tidy the grave sites. Chinese

families also enjoy taking a picnic to enjoy the spring warmth after winter. Ritual offerings to ancestors include joss sticks and joss paper, and *qīngtuán* (青团), green dumplings made from glutinous rice and barley grass or Chinese mugwort. The Qingming Festival falls on 4 April 2021.

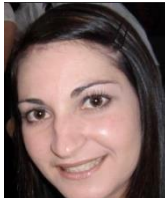

Mandarin Community Tutoring Project

With the start of another academic year, we are now receiving registrations from university students and other adults in the Canberra region interested in practising the Mandarin they are learning in various language learning programs. We then introduce them to fluent speakers of Chinese living in the ACT, and they make their own arrangements to meet, usually one-on-one once a week. All the tutors are volunteers; there is no payment involved. The project is open to everyone who is learning Chinese, or who has learned the language in the past and would like to keep up their skills. In return, tutors make more local contacts and share their skills and knowledge.

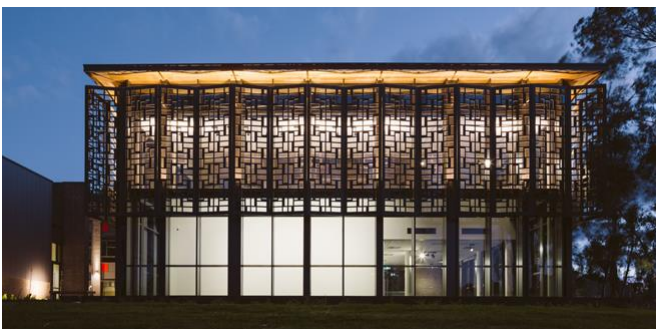
