ALMA ACTIVITIES

Mandarin Community Tutoring Project

We are anticipating more participants in the project this year now that language classes are back to face-to-face mode and international students are beginning to return to Canberra for their tertiary studies. The project is open to all adults who are currently learning Chinese or have learned the language in the past and would like to keep up their skills. We introduce learners to fluent speakers of Chinese who have volunteered to share their knowledge of Chinese language and culture. Tutor and learner then make their own arrangements to meet, usually one-on-one, once a week, at a time and place to suit both sides.

Mandarin radio program on community radio 2XX

To hear the program, tune in to Radio 2XX on 98.3 FM every Friday evening from 7pm to 7.30pm, or listen online at www.2xxfm.org.au. You can also hear previous programs through the 'On Demand' link at the same web address.

We welcome recordings from listeners for inclusion in the program, especially children, singing a song or reading a short story or poem in Mandarin. Hearing themselves on the radio is a great way to encourage children to speak and practice the Mandarin they are learning at home, preschool or school. Panda Competition 2023

The Panda Competition is conducted every year by the Australia China Friendship Society and is open to students from Pre-schools, Primary schools and High schools in the ACT and Queanbeyan. The topic for this year's competition is:

The Dragon Boat Festival

Students can do a drawing or painting, create works such as a collage or 3-dimensional construction, a poem or other creative work, appropriate to the student's age and school grade. Pre-school, Kindergarten, Year 1 and 2 students can also enter a colouring-in piece.

The entry should preferably be the work of a single student. If a joint entry for more than 1 student is submitted only a single prize will be provided. If the entry is in Mandarin, an English translation must be provided.

Entries must be received by 5pm Sunday 23 September 2023.
