


CAECC LUNAR NEW YEAR CELEBRATION

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CHINESE AUSTRALIAN EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTRE

We have had a very exciting start to the Year of the Dragon, with our Chinese/Lunar New Year Festivities on the 7th February. The celebrations started with our children beautifully dressed up in Chinese costumes, the mini Lion Dance 舞狮 by Yut Hung Kung Fu, followed by Chinese Calligraphy presentation 新春挥毫 by Samuel Wong, a Chinese instrument appreciation 古筝表演 by YaSong, ending with Lunar New Year refreshment & afternoon tea 下午茶. A BIG Thank you to Chiew Yi and Margareta from the ALMA Committee for organising this, It was wonderful afternoon.

This year we have Wiradjuri Echoes to our educational program; this program gives the children an opportunity to learn about the culture of Australia's First Nations People and embeds the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspective at the Chinese Australian Early Childhood Centre.

We have so many new children starting in February, lots of babies under two.

Our educators have been building nurturing relationships with the children, these relationships build trust and enables the children to love learning for life.

At the Centre, the children learn by play, our educators using Mandarin as they engage with the children during learning experiences, story time, music time and in everyday conversation. Play improves cognitive, physical, social, and emotional wellbeing of children and young people. Through play, children learn about the world and themselves. They also learn skills they need for study, work and relationships, such as confidence.

Our centre being bilingual has added benefits as research indicates that bilingualism influences children's ultimate acquisition of literacy through the beneficial effects of bilingualism.

Mandarin Community Tutoring Project

This free project coordinated by ALMA is open to all adults who are currently learning Chinese or have learned the language in the past and would like to keep up their skills.

We introduce learners to fluent speakers of Chinese who have volunteered to share their knowledge of Chinese language and culture. Tutor and learner then make their own arrangements to meet, usually one-on-one, once a week, at a time and place to suit both sides.
