CHINESE AUSTRALIAN EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTRE

In the last few months, children at the CAECC have been very busy with so many things and we have so many stories to share with you.

We continued to have our Music Program and Carina introduced our children to songs from all over the world. Our children especially enjoyed exploring all kinds of different percussion instruments and dancing to their beat and rhythm. The stories she brought in to share with us accompanying the instruments were also great fun and our children loved listening to them.

We also celebrated NAIDOC Week, during which Duncan Smith a Wiradjuri man came to share with our children the Aboriginal culture. We listened to Aboriginal Dreaming stories, did Aboriginal dance, and painted with Aboriginal symbols. It is very important for our children to have opportunities in engaging in learning experiences that promote their understanding of culture of the First Nations people and our centre is committed to build strong partnerships with Aboriginal communities.

During Science Week and Book Week, our children investigated a range of science concepts and read a wide selection of books. The hands-on science experiences our educators set up for both preschoolers and Infants/Toddlers supported them in developing an interest in science from a young age, and the sparkles in their wideopen eyes clearly showed this. Meanwhile, the most exciting part of Book Week has always been dressing up as your favourite character in a book. Our children were so eager to show their educators who they had dressed up as every morning.

On 1st of September, we held our Father's Day afternoon tea to celebrate all the loving and caring relationships our children have with important adults in their lives. This lovely community event not only provided our parents with an opportunity to get together, but also further build a sense of community in our centre and extend our relationships with our families. We are hoping to organise more community events in the future to bring our families together.

We will be celebrating the Mid-Autumn Festival (中秋节zhōng qiū jié) later this month and we are so looking forward to sharing some of the very famous Chinese folklore with our children, and of course, also tasting delicious moon cakes (月饼 yuè bǐng).
