Chinese Language Learning and teaching

Struggling to master written Chinese?

Don't despair - you are not alone.

According to a recent article by Judith Evans, Wired youth forget how to write in China and Japan, young people are forgetting how to write characters due to the widespread use of computers and mobile phones, which generally allow writers to use alphabet-based input systems.

The Chinese term for this is tibi wangzi 'take pen, forget character'.

A poll by the China Youth Daily in April 2010 found that 83% of the 2,072 people surveyed reported problems with writing Chinese characters.

Inventor of *hanyu pinyin* alive and well and living in Beijing!

According to an article in the *Spectator* on 7 August 2010, the person who devised the system now used in China and around the world to write Chinese using the roman alphabet, *hanyu pinyin*, is 105 year-old Zhou Youguang.

Mr Zhou was interviewed by Stephen Fry for a TV documentary on world languages. Apparently this was the first such interview the 105 year-old has given, and he speaks excellent English!
